
Issues in HIV Stigma, Discrimination, and Respectful Care for Nurses and Midwives

What are Stigma and Discrimination toward People Living with HIV?

- Prejudice, negative attitudes and abuse directed at people living with HIV and AIDS
- Some are shunned by family, peers, and community; others face poor treatment in healthcare and education settings, erosion of their human rights, and psychological damage
- These all limit access to HIV testing, treatment and other HIV services














Respectful Care in Maternity



- There are widespread reports of physical and mental abuse at facilities in Africa and other countries
- This results in lack of trust in the health care system and poor utilization of facilities with skilled birth attendants
