2020 is the World Health Organisation (WHO) "Year of the Nurse and Midwife". The first ever WHO "State of the World's Nursing" report will be released in 2020 as well as the release of the third "State of the World's Midwifery" report. 2020 is also the 200th anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale. 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
NEW BOOK LAUNCH

CHILDREN LEAD THE WAY

Support our children. Join the "strike for climate" on 20 September.

A global climate strike is planned for 20 September. The "strike for climate", driven by hundreds of thousands of schoolchildren, is asking adults around the world to join them on 20 September in demanding emergency action to tackle the climate crisis. The "strike for climate" is being held to raise awareness in the lead up to the UN Climate Action Summit 23 September 2019 in New York. World leaders are being asked to develop concrete and realistic plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 45% over the next decade and zero emissions by 2050. The UN report that global emissions are reaching record levels and show no sign of peaking, however if action is taken now, carbon emissions can be reduced within 12 years and the global average temperature held to well below 2°C. <https://www.un.org/en/climatechange/un-climate-summit-2019.shtml>



The Oxford Textbook of Global Health of Women, Newborns, Children, and Adolescents has recently been released. The textbook follows women from adolescence to motherhood, it covers sexual and reproductive health, HIV, pregnancy, mental health, and much more. Child development is traced from conception through to pregnancy, the newborn period, and into childhood and adolescence. The textbook asks uncomfortable but necessary questions about the determinants of health, such as maltreatment, injury, and malnutrition, and looks at how to influence policy and inspire change. The book has a clear structure, helpful illustrations, study questions in each chapter, and is easy to use. It can be purchased in hard copy or digital edition. MEDICAL AID FILMS

Medical Aid Films has partnered with Picture Health to make available thirteen films on paediatric HIV and the treatment of children living with HIV. Early diagnosis and access to HIV treatment is vital to reducing early mortality in HIV-infected infants. Without treatment, about one third of children living with HIV die by their first birthday and half die by their second.

HPV VACCINE SUCCESS IN REDUCING CERVICAL CANCER

Research published in *The Lancet* has highlighted the success of the human papilloma virus (HPV) vaccine in reducing infections among young women and girls. HPV, which is sexually transmitted, can cause cervical cancer as well as anogenital warts. In 2018 there were 569,000 cases of cervical cancer worldwide and 313,365 deaths, 80% of which were in poorer countries. The WHO is setting goals for reducing the number of cases of cervical cancer to no more than 4 per 100,000 population.
