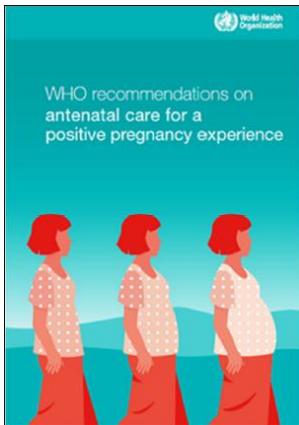




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WHO REVISES ANTENATAL RECOMMENDATIONS January 2018



First trimester
Contact 1: up to 12 weeks
Second trimester
Contact 2: 20 weeks
Contact 3: 26 weeks
Third trimester
Contact 4: 30 weeks
Contact 5: 34 weeks
Contact 6: 36 weeks
Contact 7: 38 weeks
Contact 8: 40 weeks
Return for delivery at 41 weeks if not given birth.
Note: Intermittent preventive treatment of malaria in pregnancy should be started at ≥ 13 weeks.

The World Health Organisation (WHO), in partnership with USAID's Maternal and Child Survival Program (MCSP) has released two summary briefs on *WHO Recommendations on Antenatal Care for a Positive Pregnancy Experience* (January 2018). Recent evidence, the WHO found, suggest that the focused antenatal care model of four antenatal visits is associated with more perinatal deaths than ANC models that comprise at least eight contact visits between the pregnant woman and the health care provider.

This is a really important change in approach which needs to be brought to the attention of all midwives and maternity care service providers.

The WHO report that approximately 303,000 women and adolescent girls died from pregnancy and childbirth related complications in 2015 and 2.6 million babies were stillborn. Almost all the maternal deaths (99%) and child deaths (98%) occurred in low and middle income countries and could have been prevented with access to quality antenatal care. The summary includes the recommended WHO model and a table of health system interventions to improve the utilisation and quality of antenatal care.
